The most important is the right to life.

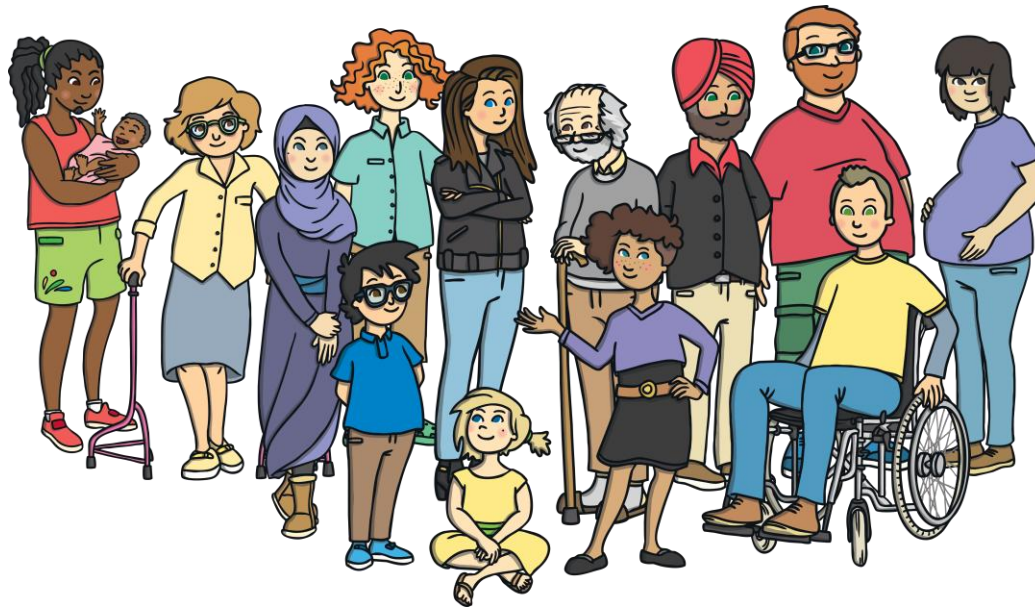

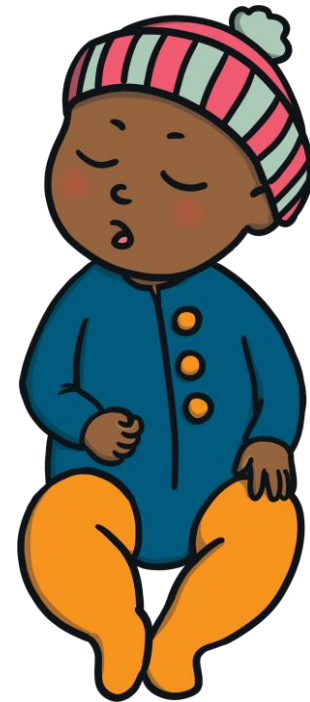

UN Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC)

The **UN Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC)** is an important, legally binding agreement signed by 196 countries (as of 12 July 2022) which outlines the fundamental rights of every child, regardless of their race, religion or abilities.

It is the most complete statement of children's rights ever produced and is the most widely-ratified international human rights treaty in history.

You have the right to be listened to.



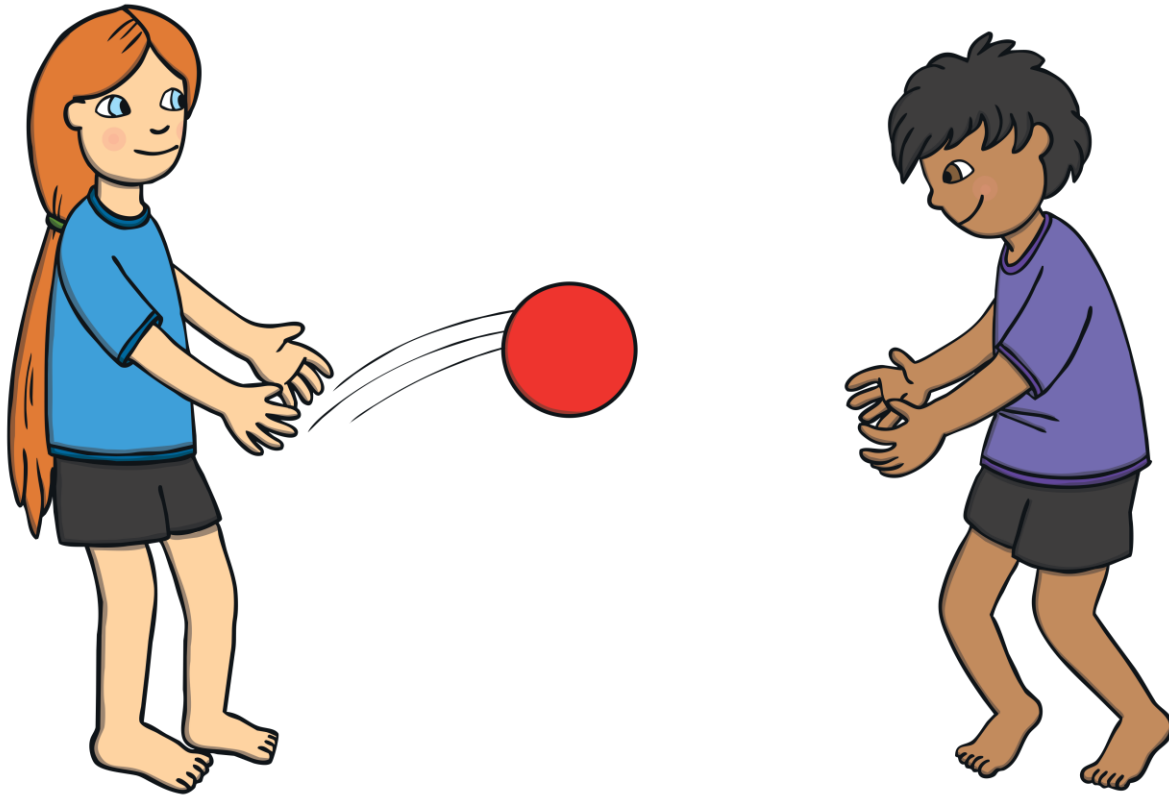
Children's Rights

You have the right to safe carers to live with, in case you can't be looked after by your family.



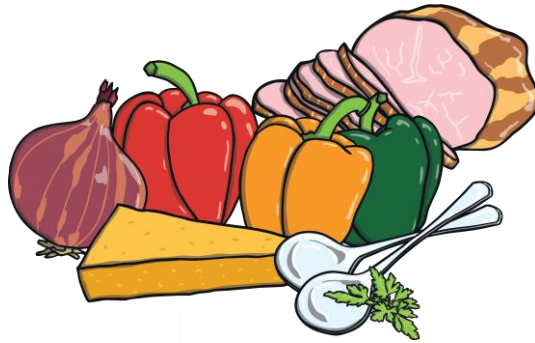
Children's Rights

You have the right to be helped to join in and be part of the community if you have a disability.



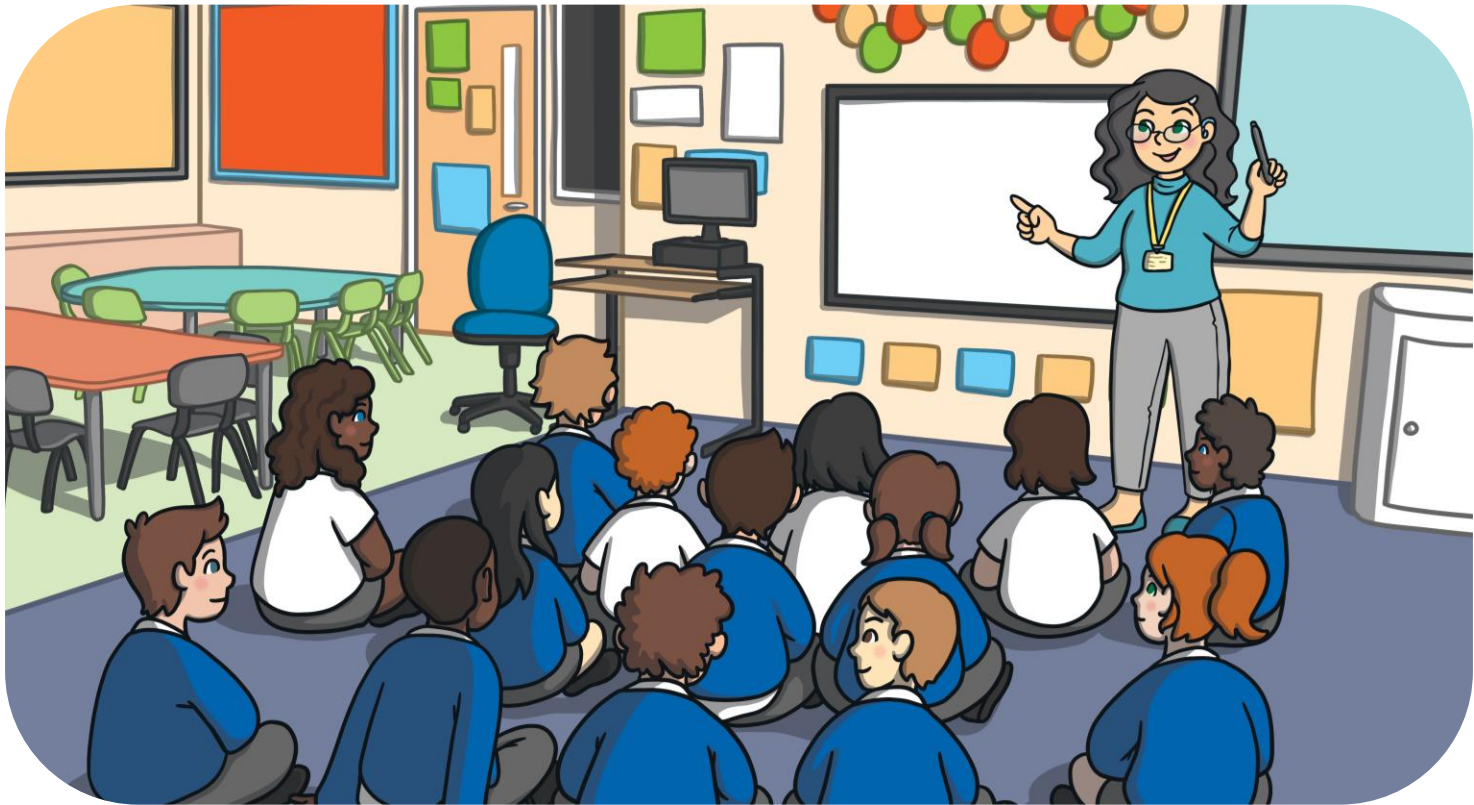
Children's Rights

You have the right to be healthy by getting the best possible health care, clean water and nutritious food.



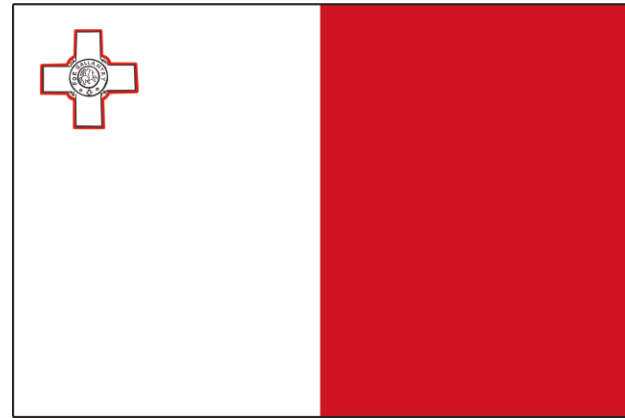
Children's Rights

You have the right to go to school and get an education.



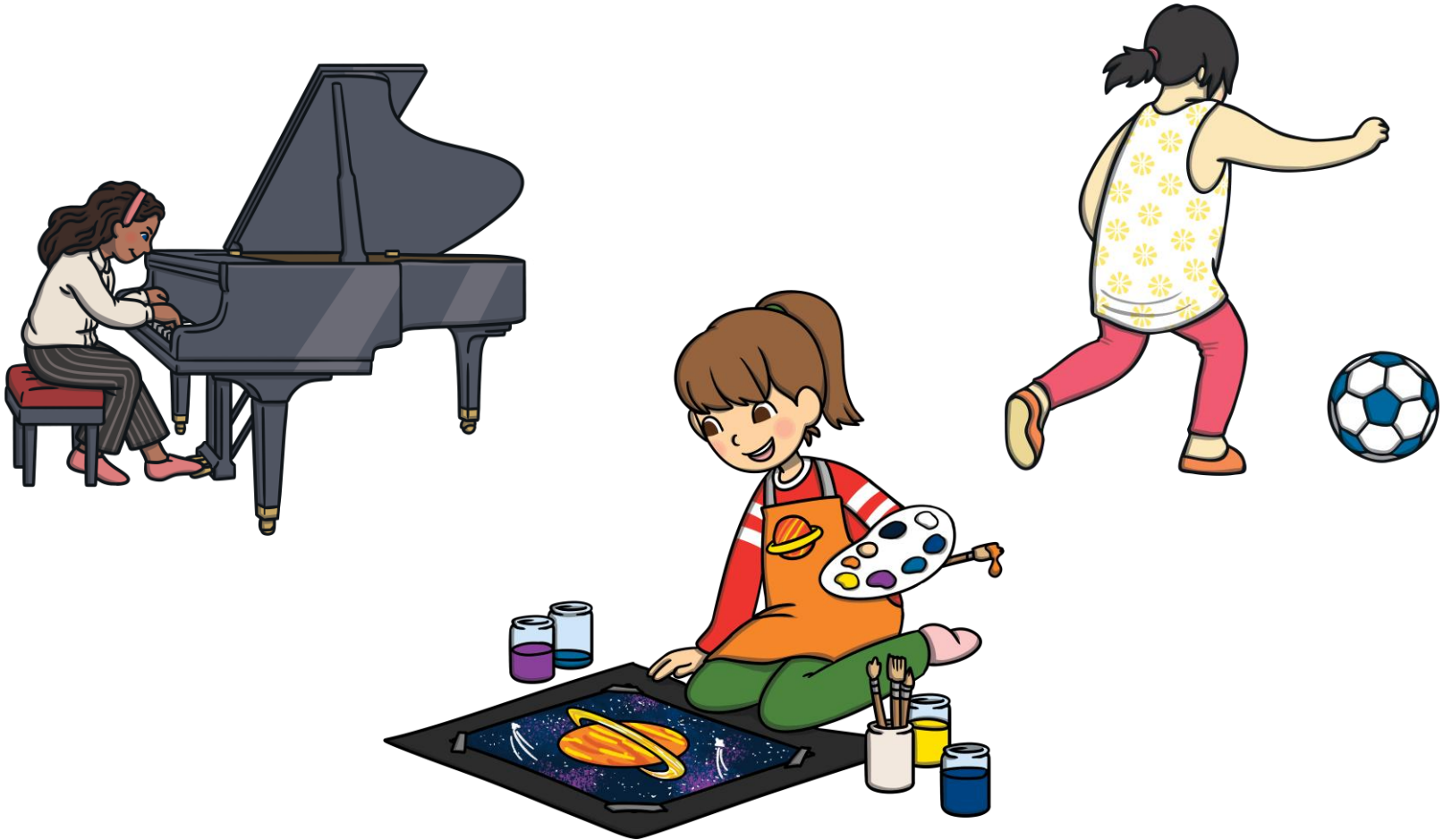
Children's Rights
